Robert Francis Cooper was born on 28 August 1947 in Brentwood, Essex, and educated at the Delamere School for Boys, Nairobi, Kenya and Worcester College, Oxford. He spent the academic year 1969-1970 at the University of Pennsylvania on a Thuron Scholarship and joined the Diplomatic Service of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office in 1970. As a diplomat, he has worked at various British Embassies abroad, notably those in Tokyo and Bonn. At the Foreign Office, he was Head of the Policy Planning Staff from 1989 to 1993. He has also been seconded to the Bank of England and spent a period in the Cabinet Office as Deputy Secretary for Defense and Overseas Affairs. He was the UK's Special Representative in Afghanistan until mid-2002.
